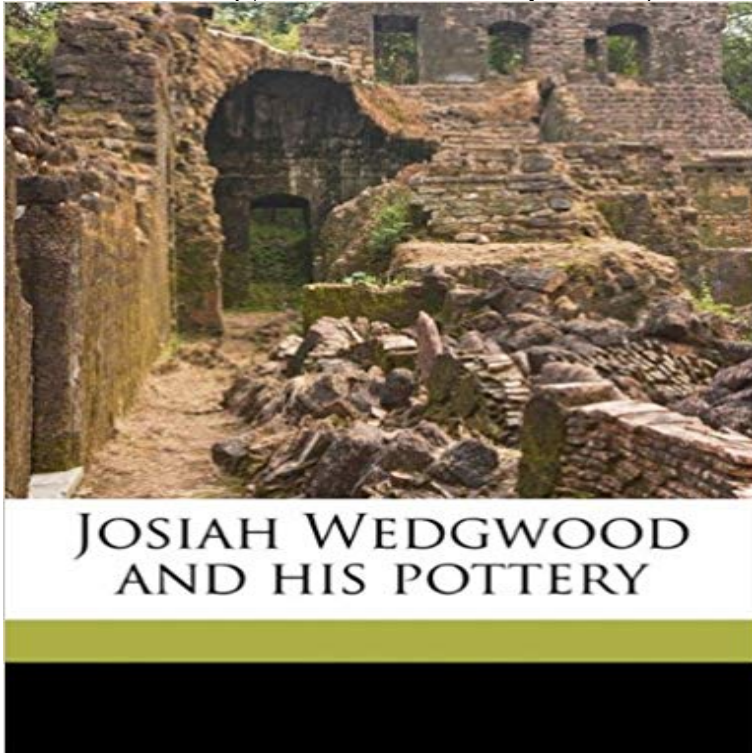


Josiah Wedgwood and his pottery
