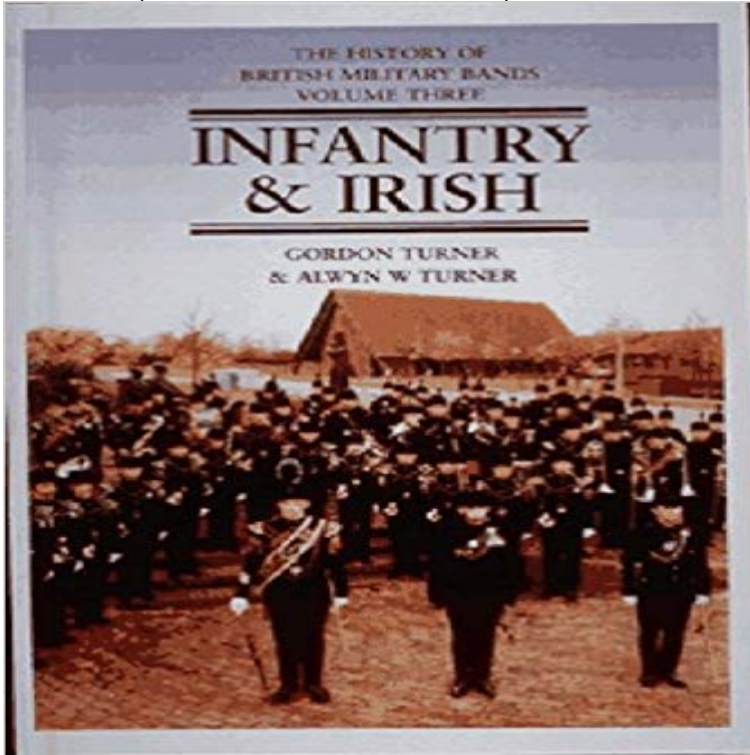


History of British Military Bands: Infantry and Irish (v. 3)
